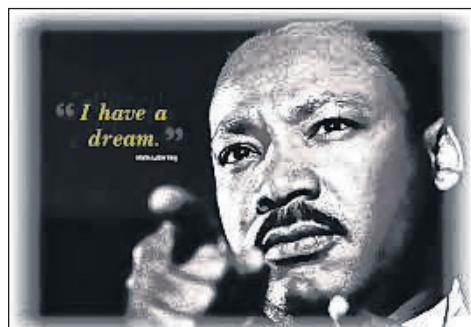

President Barack Obama broke barriers and made history upon becoming the 44th President of the United States.

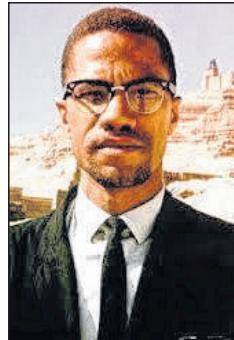
His slogan, "Yes We Can," encapsulated the spirit of progress. He is known for his efforts to bridge divides, implement healthcare reform, and more.

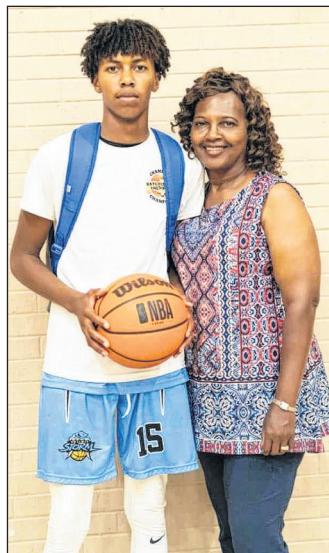

NATCHITOCHES – The Creole Heritage Center at Northwestern State University has developed a strategic plan that reconfirms its mission and will guide its future programming. The public to one of three upcoming information sessions where highlights of the plan will be presented.

According to Dr. Kent Peacock, director of the Creole Heritage Center, development of the plan took two years and came out of discussions with CHC staff, the CHC's Advisory Council, Creoles from throughout Louisiana, and the nation, the NSU community, and representatives from the cultural heritage, political, business, and educational entities. An electronic survey distributed last year collected additional input from more than 500 responders. The plan's creation was financially supported by the Cane River National Heritage Area.

The upcoming strategic plan informational sessions are of particular interest to all those interested in the CHC's revised mission of preserving, educating, and advocating the value and significance of the vibrant Louisiana Creole people and their culture, as well as in NSU's role in preserving the rich and diverse cultural heritage of Louisiana and providing students with hands-on experience in this growing field.

The first will take place from 6:30-7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 30, at St. Augustine Catholic Church, 2262 Hwy 484, Natchez, Louisiana. A second session will take place via webinar from 8-9 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 31. Anyone interested in joining should contact the Creole Heritage Center for login information. The third session will be from 11:45 a.m.-12:45 p.m. Friday, Sept. 8, in the President's Room of

the Sylvan Friedman Student Union on the NSU campus.

The Creole Heritage Center opened its doors as a part of NSU in 1998 and became a respected and trusted leader of the "Creole Renaissance," the movement to preserve and advocate for Louisiana Creoles and their heritage. The

Center is located in Kyser Hall, Room 116. Hours are 8 a.m.-3 p.m. Monday-Thursday or by appointment.

will we allow it to lead us to make positive changes? What the enemy means for evil, God always turns around for good.

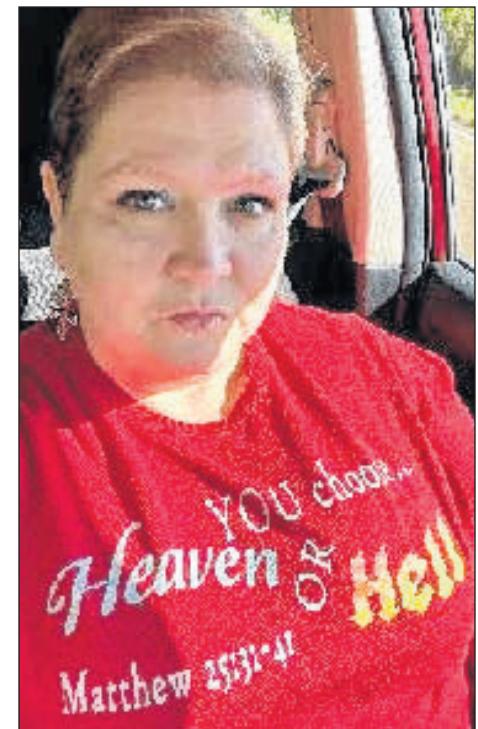

When I was 9, as a result of that rape, my mind adapted to being a product of my environment of sex and only being good for that type of activity; however, at 30, for me, I met Jesus, and in meeting Him, I learned I was not who I had become, so I faced my trauma and allowed myself to change. Me choosing Jesus was my way of choosing to change.

Football -- Demons Set for Second Scrimmage of Fall Camp

NATCHITOCHES – If the first preseason “game” of Northwestern State’s fall camp was an appetizer, this Saturday’s second intrasquad scrimmage may serve as more of a main course.

The Demons will take the Turpin Stadium field around 9:30 a.m. Saturday their second full-pads scrimmage of camp, looking to expand on last week’s balanced effort.

“One more Saturday closer to real game day,” sixth-year head coach Brad Laird said. “This being our second what we call preseason game – for the simple fact in college you don’t have the opportunity to go against another opponent – we want them to understand this is

not just another practice. We were able to get 60 to 70 snaps last week, and we want to expand that to 100 snaps this week.

“Once you get done with Saturday’s scrimmage, depth charts are going to be close to locked in as we approach the mock scrimmage next week and the game week after that.”

In addition to the expansion in terms of plays, Laird and his staff hope to see what has become a trend throughout camp continue along.

The Northwestern State offense started the first scrimmage of camp quickly, scoring a touchdown on the third play from scrimmage and adding another on the third possession before

the Purple Swarm defense settled in and turned the tide in the middle part of the scrimmage.

The sides split a pair of two-minute-drill results, with Tyler Vander Waal connecting with Twon Hines on a 21-yard touchdown before the defense answered on a final-play forced fumble by Justice Galloway-Velazquez that Kwame Sarkodie recovered in mid-air.

“It’s been that way in practice, and that’s a good thing because whoever came out with a hot start, the other side was able to rally back and overcome the adversity and negative plays,” Laird said. “That’s been good to see. That’s been every practice. It’s been the same as far as intensity.

“We’ve been up and down this week. We’ve got to be better consistently as far as learning how to practice. We saw that in Thursday night’s practice. There was a lot better tempo, a lot better energy, and a lot better effort than what we had the previous day. Hopefully, we can build off that going into this scrimmage.”

Preventing Youth Suicide: Tips for Parents & Educators

Provided by: National Association of School Psychologists

Suicide is the leading cause of death among school-age youth. However, **suicide is preventable**. Youth who are contemplating suicide frequently give warning signs of their distress. Parents, teachers, and friends are in a key position to pick up on these signs and get help. Most important is to never take these warning signs lightly or promise to keep them secret. When all adults and students in the school community are committed to making suicide prevention a priority and are empowered to take the correct actions—we can help youth before they engage in behavior with irreversible consequences.

If you or someone you know is suicidal, get help immediately via 911, the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-TALK, or the Crisis Text Line (text "HOME" to 741741).

Suicide Risk Factors

Although far from perfect predictors, certain characteristics are associated with increased odds of having suicidal thoughts. These include:

- Mental illness, including depression, conduct disorders, and substance abuse.
- Family stress/dysfunction.
- Environmental risks, including the presence of a firearm in the home.
- Situational crises (e.g., traumatic death of a loved one, physical or sexual abuse, family violence).

Suicide Warning Signs

Most suicidal youth demonstrate observable behaviors that signal their suicidal thinking. These include:

- Suicidal threats in the form of direct ("I am going to kill myself") and indirect ("I wish I could fall asleep and never wake up again") statements.
- Suicide notes and plans (including online postings).
- Prior suicidal behavior.
- Making final arrangements (e.g., making funeral arrangements, writing a will, giving away prized possessions).
- Preoccupation with death.
- Changes in behavior, appearance, thoughts, and/or feelings.

Youth who feel suicidal are not likely to seek help directly; however, parents, school personnel, and peers can recognize the warning signs and take immediate action to keep the youth safe. When a youth gives

signs that they may be considering suicide, the following actions should be taken:

- Remain calm.
- Ask the youth directly if he or she is thinking about suicide (e.g., "Are you thinking of suicide?").
- Focus on your concern for their well-being and avoid being accusatory.
- Listen.
- Reassure them that there is help and they will not feel like this forever.
- Do not judge.
- Provide constant supervision. Do not leave the youth alone.
- Remove means for self-harm.
- **Get help:** No one should ever agree to keep a youth's suicidal thoughts a secret and instead should tell an appropriate caregiving adult, such as a parent, teacher, or school psychologist. Parents should seek help from school or community mental health resources as soon as possible. School staff should take the student to a school-employed mental health professional or administrator.

The Role of the School in Suicide Prevention

Children and adolescents spend a substantial part of their day in school under the supervision of school personnel. Effective suicide and violence prevention is integrated with supportive mental health services, engages the entire school community, and is imbedded in a positive school climate through student behavioral expectations and a caring and trusting student/adult relationship. Therefore, it is crucial for all school staff members to be familiar with, and watchful for, risk factors and warning signs of suicidal behavior. The entire school staff should work to create an environment where students feel safe sharing such information. School psychologists and other crisis response team personnel, including the school counselor and school administrator, are trained to intervene when a student is identified at risk for suicide. These individuals conduct suicide risk assessment, warn/inform parents, provide recommendations and referrals to community services, and often provide follow up counseling and support at school.

Parental Notification and Participation

Even if a youth is judged to be at low risk for suicidal behavior, schools may ask parents to sign a documentation form to indicate that relevant information has been provided. Parental notifications must be documented. Additionally, parents are

crucial members of a suicide risk assessment as they often have information critical to making an appropriate assessment of risk, including mental health history, family dynamics, recent traumatic events, and previous suicidal behaviors. After a school notifies a parent of their child's risk for suicide and provides referral information, the responsibility falls upon the parent to seek mental health assistance for their child. Parents must:

- Continue to take threats seriously: Follow through is important even after the child calms down or informs the parent "they didn't mean it." Avoid assuming behavior is simply attention seeking (but at the same time, avoid reinforcing suicide threats, e.g., by allowing the student who has threatened suicide to drive because they were denied access to the car).
- Access school supports: If parents are uncomfortable with following through on referrals, they can give the school psychologist permission to contact the referral agency, provide referral information, and follow up on the visit.
- Maintain communication with the

school: After such an intervention, the school will also provide follow-up support. Your communication will be crucial to ensuring that the school is the safest, most comfortable place for your child.

Resiliency Factors

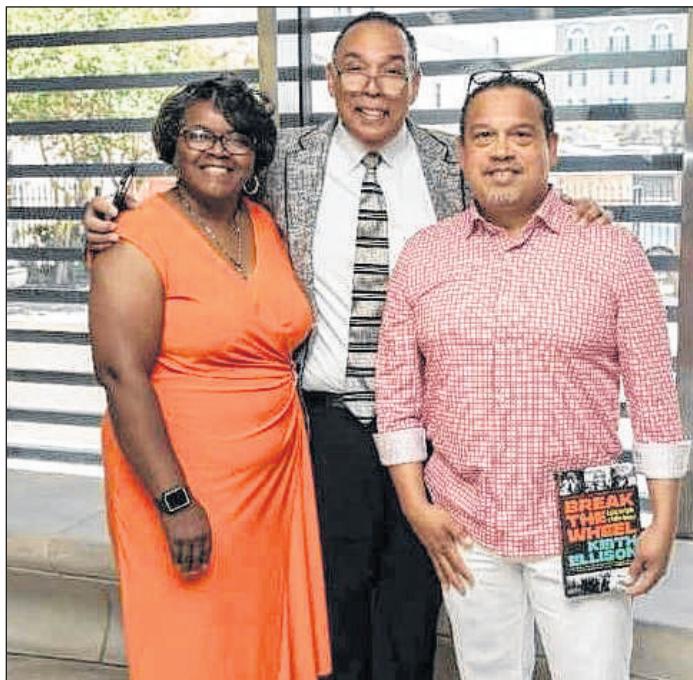
The presence of resiliency factors can lessen the potential of risk factors to lead to suicidal ideation and behaviors. Once a child or adolescent is considered at risk, schools, families, and friends should work to build these factors in and around the youth. These include:

- Family support and cohesion, including good communication.
- Peer support and close social networks.
- School and community connectedness.
- Cultural or religious beliefs that discourage suicide and promote healthy living.
- Adaptive coping and problem-solving skills, including conflict-resolution.
- General life satisfaction, good self-esteem, sense of purpose.
- Easy access to effective medical and mental health resources.

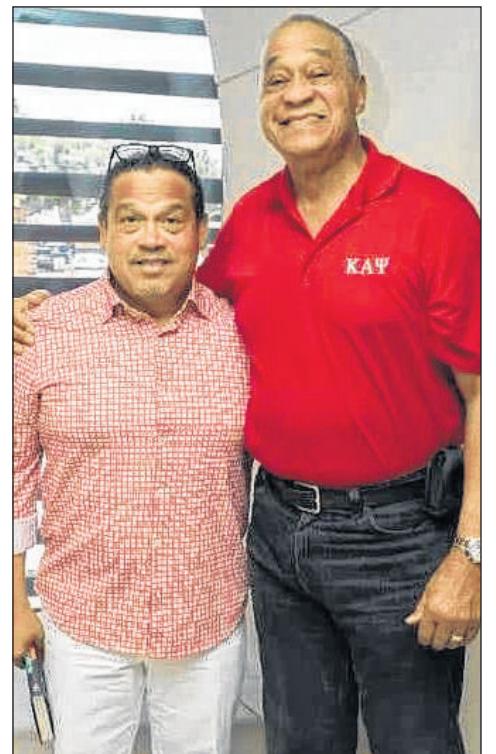
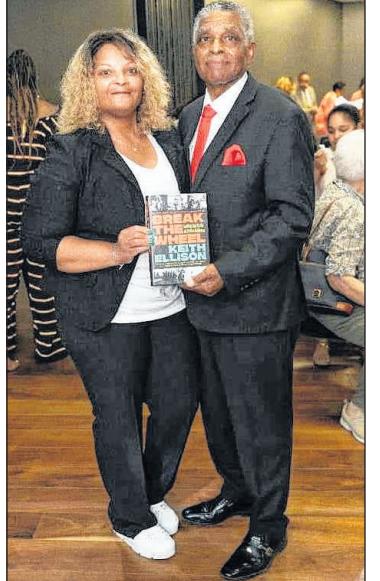

Dr. E. A. Johnson and Mrs. Crittie Johnson, First Offices

One of the few Black doctors in the parish, Dr. E. A. Johnson came from Powhatan, Louisiana, was trained at Meharry Medical School in Tennessee, and established his practice in Natchitoches, where he was the sole provider of medical care for African Americans. His wife, Crittie Carroll Johnson, was the daughter of a funeral home director and attended college in Kansas City. She was the first African American female mortician in Natchitoches and one of the first in Louisiana.

Dr. Johnson and Mrs. Johnson were very active in the Civil Rights movement and spearheaded efforts to integrate the Louisiana Normal School (now Northwestern State University), persuading NAACP attorney Thurgood Marshall to investigate the situation (Martin 2001:69). Dr. Johnson also served as the

president of the Louisiana NAACP.

He was the person that caused us to want to exercise this right that we had. He stayed at the polls ... and asked people to go to the polls and vote.

Dr. Johnson had his clinic, Mrs. Johnson had her mortuary, and they rented out space for a barbershop and shoe-shine in their first place of business, pictured below.

The most famous doctor of all in this particular community for African Americans was Dr. Johnson. He was a physician in this community, and under the conditions that Dr. Johnson worked in this community, [it] was very dangerous. Because at that time, when he had his private practice in this community, in Natchitoches parish, he was also the president of the NAACP.

The Johnsons moved from Amulet Street to Fifth Street in Jackson Square, where their home also served

as a meeting place for Civil Rights organizers and supporters.

And you know, the home that Doc and his wife built on Fifth Street, his wife said that one reason they wanted to build a

house with as many bedrooms was because there were no Black hotels, no hotels available for Blacks. And she called one of the bedrooms Thurgood Marshall's bedroom because that's where he would sleep.

Six One Way, Half Dozen the Other

During slavery, and especially during the mid-1800s, it was northerners and the Republican Party that advocated against the institution of slavery that ultimately led to the civil war. And, with Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation that freed the slaves, and with the passage and ratification of the 13th, 14th, and 15th Amendments, when allowed to vote, African Americans always voted Republican. In the South, some were bullied, beaten, and even lynched, but still voted Republican when given the opportunity.

From the beginning of slavery until after the Civil War, it was the Southern states and the Democratic Party that were the cornerstone of the peculiar institution of slavery. After the civil war, it was the Democratic Party in the South that instituted and maintained the Brutal Era of Jim Crow for nearly a century. Then at the 1948 Democratic National Convention, Southern Democrats led by South Carolina Governor (and later U.S. Senator) Strom Thurmond became outraged over a Civil Rights Plank and broke away from the Democratic Party and established the States' Rights Party, better known as the "Dixiecrats." Many believe this was the beginning of southern democrats' migration to the Republican Party.

During the presidential election of 1960, Democratic Candidate John F. Kennedy made a call to then Georgia's Governor Ernest Vandiver, who, through back channels, quietly secured the release of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who

was being held in a Georgia Prison. With that phone call and release of Dr. King, John F. Kennedy was rewarded with the African American vote and won the 1960 presidential campaign. This action led to a transformation moving African Americans permanently to the democratic party while pushing southern whites even further toward the Republican Party.

After President Kennedy was assassinated, President Lyndon Johnson passed the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965, which permanently sealed the deal of African Americans voting predominately Democrat. President Johnson, a brilliant political analyst, foresaw the consequences of his legislation. On the day he signed the first bill into law, he is said to have remarked, "We've lost the SOUTH for a generation." So far, it's been a half-century, with no return in sight!

The transformation of the South becoming predominantly Republican became as complete as complete could be during the 1980 presidential campaign when Republican Presidential Candidate Ronald Reagan promoted his "Welfare Queen" rhetoric stating that welfare recipients were buying T-Bone Steaks with food stamps and driving Cadillacs with multiple welfare benefits while you (many poor and working-class American's) all with taxpayers' dollars.

Moving on to the 2016 presidential Campaign, Donald Trump convinced many of his supporters that he would "Make America Great Again," meaning, in my opinion,



that he would bring America back to the Pre-Civil Rights Era and before 1960.

To close, I have always been a conservative Black Man who has always felt that every tub should stand on its bottom. Politically I could have called myself a Conservative Democrat or been seen as a Moderate Republican. But since the arrival of Donald Trump and his "MAGA," I could never be any part of the Republican Party. But in total honesty, as I have grown politically and in life, I have come to have deep reservations with the Democratic Party, with my main concern being that

many Democratic Programs that are designed to be a safety net for those in need have led to a continuous cycle of generational poverty among those its design to help with no end in sight. Secondly, the issues, programs, and groups that the National Democratic Party supports have a slight drop off when speaking of state democrats and are nonexistent on the local level. In all truth, on the local level, you really can tell the difference between National Republicans and many Local Democrats. That is why I say when it comes to both major political parties, it's "six one way, half dozen the other." Not impressed with either party!

The Do's and Don'ts of Police Car Stops

If you are pulled over in a traffic stop and have a hands-free phone station in your vehicle, consider turning on your camera to record the interaction. Make sure to do this before the officer gets out of the police car so they don't see you and mistakenly think you are reaching for a weapon.

If you are stopped in your car, DO...

If you are stopped while in a car, the police must have reasonable suspicion for believing that you have committed a traffic violation or criminal offense.

DO keep your hands on the wheel and let the officer know what you are doing for your safety. ("I'm going to reach for my registration now.") Many Black people have been shot and killed when police claimed they made sudden hand movements.

DO show your license, registration, and proof of insurance when asked.

DO sign your ticket if you are given one. Otherwise, you may be arrested.

DO take the DUI test if you are arrested unless you are willing to risk your license

being suspended. Before you are arrested, you may refuse to take the Preliminary Alcohol Screening (PAS) breathalyzer test unless you are under the age of 21.

In the state of Louisiana, you have the right to refuse a breathalyzer or blood test. That right, however, comes with serious consequences. The state of Louisiana is an implied consent state.

DO keep your car interior clear of unnecessary objects. It may give the police reason to search the car. If they see anything illegal, this may create probable cause for them to search you or your car. They cannot search the trunk unless they have your consent, a search warrant, or probable cause to believe the trunk contains evidence of a crime.

DO say, "I do not consent to a search."

If you are stopped in your car, DON'T... **DON'T** physically resist a search. Say, "I do not consent to a search."

DON'T refuse to sign a ticket. You can be arrested for it.

DON'T search for your license or registration until you are asked to provide it. Let the officer know what you are doing

for your safety. ("I'm going to reach for my registration now.") Many Black people have been shot and killed when police claimed they made sudden hand movements.

DON'T disrespect the officer. Although you have a constitutional right to do so, it could lead to your arrest.

DON'T attempt to bribe the police.

The Do's and Don'ts of Arrests

If you are arrested or taken to a police station, DO...

DO ask if you can park your car in a safe place or have a licensed driver take it away if you are arrested. This will avoid expensive towing or impoundment fees.

If the police arrest you, they must have probable cause for believing that you have committed a crime.

DO tell the police your name and basic identifying information. But nothing else.

DO say, "I want to remain silent," and clearly state, "I want to talk to a lawyer." They should stop questioning you after that. If they do not stop questioning, calmly and clearly repeat that you want to remain silent and that you want to speak to a lawyer.

DO make sure you get your phone call within three hours of getting arrested or immediately after being booked. You can call a lawyer, bail bondsman, relative, or any other person. Memorize phone numbers ahead of time.

DO assume the police are recording your calls (except the call with your lawyer).

If you are arrested or taken to a police station, DON'T...

DON'T try to run, resist, fight back, or reach suddenly for any items in your pockets or clothing, as this could lead to law enforcement causing you physical harm.

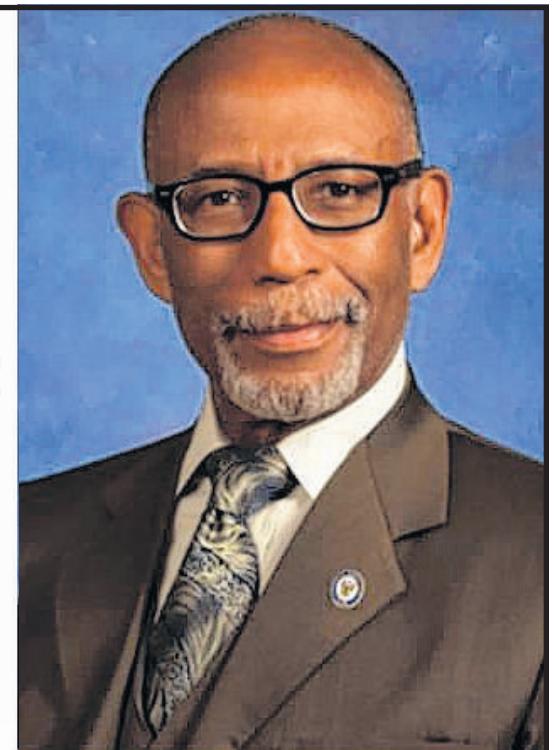
DON'T give them any information except for your name and basic identifying information.

DON'T give explanations, excuses, or stories. Say, "I want to remain silent," and "I want to talk to a lawyer."

DON'T consent to any searches or give up your right to a lawyer.

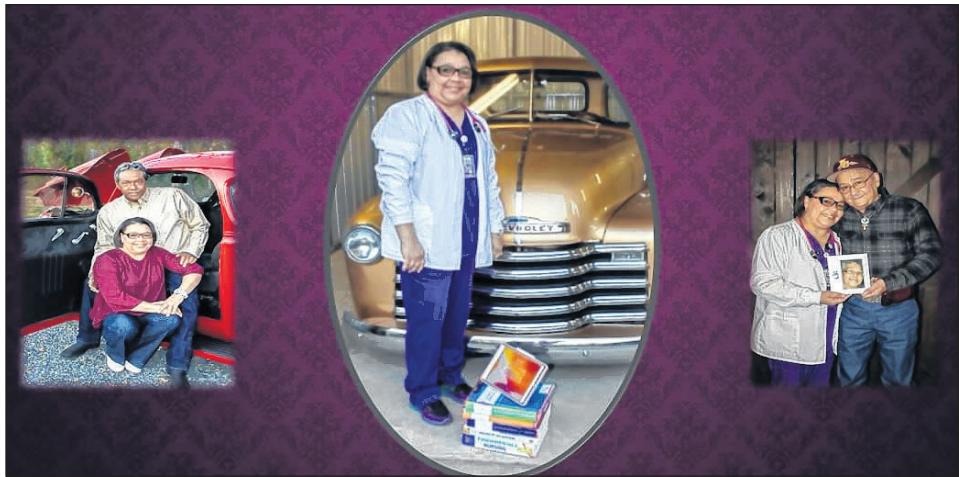
DON'T talk about your case on the phone. The police might be recording your phone calls (except those to your lawyer).

DON'T make any decisions in your case without talking to a lawyer first.

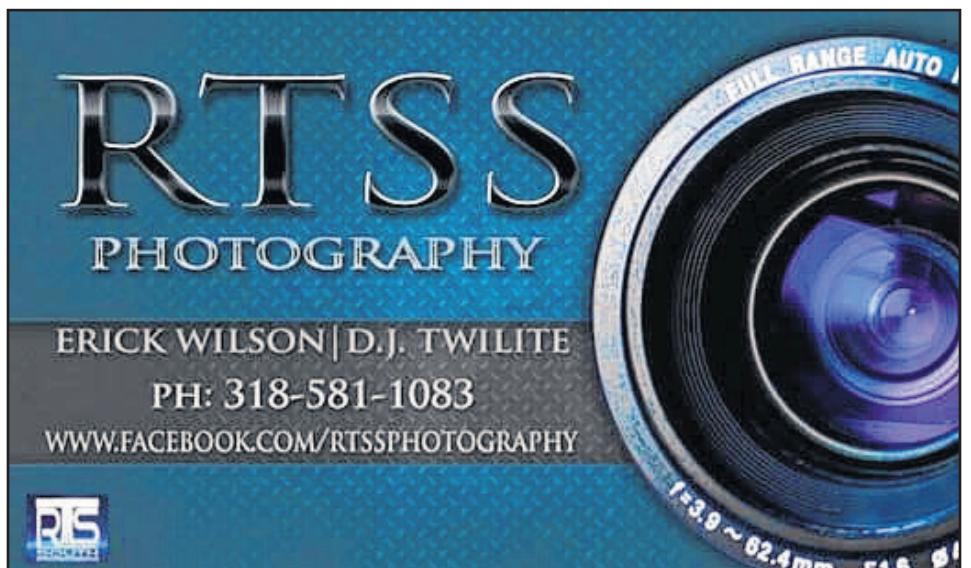

Five Cures for Living Paycheck to Paycheck

Have you ever felt like you've experienced that old saying of having "too much month at the end of the money?" If so, these simple solutions could be for you!

Get Organized: List all your fixed and variable expenses along with your debts (credit cards, mortgages, car loans, school loans, etc.) and any fixed or foreseeable expenses. Try: Downloading a free fitness app or workout routine.

Instead of: Paying for an audiobook subscription

Try: Checking out free audiobooks from your local library.

Instead of: Buying new beauty or household products

Try: Looking up DIY solutions for creams, potions, and cleaners.

Instead of: Going to the car wash

Try: Washing your car yourself.

Instead of: Paying full price for goods or services

Try: Checking online for coupons, rebates, and discounts.
