The Importance of Black History

Black History Month as we know it today has origins in the early 20th century. Over time, what started as an idea has grown into an internationally recognized observance. This transformation is the result of the unrelenting efforts of individuals and organizations advocating for the acknowledgement and celebration of African American contributions and achievements.

In 1926, Dr. Carter G. Woodson and the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History established Negro History Week to recognize and promote the contributions of African Americans to American history. They selected the second week of February to be inclusive of the respective birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. This week was initially focused on schools and communities and involved the promotion of literature, events, and activities that highlighted Black history. Over the years, the observance gained popularity and recognition, and in the late 1960s during the civil rights movement, there was a push to extend the celebration beyond a week to encompass the entire month of February. In 1976, President Gerald Ford officially recognized Black History Month, calling upon the public to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of



Black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history."


Each year, Black History Month has a specific theme, often chosen to reflect significant aspects of African American history and culture. The theme for Black History Month 2024 is "African Americans and the Arts". The theme explores the innovation, creativity, and resilience of a culture that has soothed and uplifted spirits for centuries.

It also highlights the many impacts African Americans have had on cultural movements, music, and visual arts.

In the amazing, historic City of Natchitoches we have no shortage of African Americans that embody this year's theme. Arguably, the most notable example of African Americans and the Art in Natchitoches is Clementine Hunter. Clementine Hunter is recognized as one of the most important self-taught artists in the United States. Posthumously, her art has been featured in numerous exhibitions and her paintings are held in collections of major museums and galleries including the Smithsonian Institute and the Louvre.

During Black History Month we take the time to reflect, educate, and celebrate both the achievements and struggles of African Americans. Clementine Hunter was born on a plantation and died on a plantation. She never learned to read or write. Her first paintings were sold for as little as 25 cents. But she was awarded an honorary doctoral degree in Art from the Northwestern State University and now her paintings are sold for thousands of dollars.

I am proud of my African American roots. As I reflect on my life, I am so grateful to trailblazers who paved the way for me. These historical figures overcame adversity to make lasting contributions to society. I am also proud that I too will one day be looked upon as a trailblazing, historical figure. On August 15, 2020, I was elected to serve as the first African American mayor for the great City of Natchitoches. In my short tenure as mayor, I have aggressively pursued grants. We have brought in \$40 million dollars in grant funding that will fund major

improvements and projects throughout the city. I have focused on public safety. We gave the officers of the Natchitoches Police Department a raise and implemented Crime Stoppers to help make the city safer. I have implemented infrastructure improvements. We repaved streets and replaced water lines. I have even more plans for our great city, and I know that one day, history will hold me to account.

We are all living a life that will one day be recorded in the annals of history. The importance of Black History is multifaceted and extends far beyond the confines of a specific month or celebration. Ours is a history that starts long before slavery and is rooted in rich African countries steeped with culture, traditions, and heritage. Black history highlights the significant contributions of African Americans in various fields such as science, literature, arts, politics, and more. Recognizing these achievements helps build a more accurate and inclusive narrative of history. Black history sheds light on the historical struggles faced by African Americans, including slavery, segregation,

and systemic racism. Understanding this history is crucial for addressing ongoing issues of social justice and equity. It serves as a foundation for addressing systemic inequalities and advocating for policies that promote

equality and fairness. This understanding helps break down stereotypes, challenge biases, and create environments that embrace people from all racial and ethnic backgrounds. Black history is American history.



ENTREPRENEUR SPOTLIGHT "KELLY JACKSON"

Kelly Jackson Shares her Creole Heritage with the World

Kelly Jackson's beginnings in film is a story of being in the right place at the right time. She was spending a day at Long beach when she was asked to perform as an extra in a film that was shooting that day. "I said yes, and my 30-year career started at that moment," she recalls. She was a student at Long Beach City College when she first became enamored with media and the entertainment industry. In those early days and into her career, Kelly worked in public broadcasting, modeling, filmmaking, history telling, and film festival production.

Kelly is the creator of the Cane River Film Festival. The film festival is sponsored by her historical preservation nonprofit – the Resurrection Fern Foundation. Resurrection Fern serves as a way for Kelly to support her community events and historical films. The seventh annual Cane River Film Festival is set for March 23, 2024. The festival's purpose is to celebrate and preserve Cane River's

Creole heritage through the arts. The festival also is a great way for filmmakers, community leaders, and businesses to connect and work together. "It is all about building a network," Kelly says. "My guests have become friends over the years. You can see them staying connected through social media and developing relationships that last and help support what they are doing in their lives."

A project close to Kelly's heart is the documentary The Life and Times of Marie Thérèse Coincoin, a film about her ancestors in 17th Century Natchitoches, Louisiana. Kelly Jackson is a 7th generation descendant of Marie Thérèse Coincoin and Claude Thomas Pierre Metoyer. "On Facebook in 2010, I noticed others with the odd name of my grandmother from Louisiana," Kelly says. "She never knew of her family history, so finding these roots was life changing." Kelly was so inspired by Coincoin's story from slavery to freedom that she wanted her to be the focus of her next film.

After many years in the industry, Kelly is ready for her next act. "My goal as a creative artist and historian is to continue sharing my Creole heritage and history through my platforms and art," Kelly says. "In my next level, I want to continue building on stronger network alliances and sponsorship connections that will create a better future and elevate my grassroots brand to a worldwide platform." Kelly's top sponsor for The Cane River Film Festival is Lieutenant Governor Billy Nungesser.



Information on the Presidential Preference Primary

From the Natchitoches Parish Clerk of Court's Office

The Presidential Preference Primary is scheduled in Louisiana on Saturday March 23, 2024. Among election followers, the Presidential Preference Primary (PPP) is known to be confusing and unfortunately maddening to many. All Natchitoches Parish polling places will be open on this day from 7:00 AM until 8:00 PM.

This election serves the Democratic and Republican Parties as the mechanism to help choose their Presidential candidates for November's national election. The PPP election can be misunderstood because it is one of the few elections that currently allow Democrats to only vote for Democrats and Republicans to only vote for Republicans. Voters that are not registered Democrat or Republican cannot vote in this part of the election because it is for their party members only. This means citizens registered No Party, Independent, or any other political party will not vote in this portion of the election.

If you are unsure how you are registered, there are a couple of easy ways to find out. You can go to the Louisiana Secretary of State's voter portal, geauxvote.com, enter your name and requested information and you will confirm how you are registered. Voters can also call the Natchitoches Parish Registrar of Voters office at 318-357-2211 to confirm that information.

For Voters that would like to become a member of one of the political parties or change their political party registration, they can do that on-line via the Geauxvote.com app by March 2. If you would prefer to make that change in person, you can do that at the Registrar's office at the Natchitoches Parish Courthouse Monday through Friday 8:30 to 4:30. If you make the change in person, it must be done by February 21.

In parts of the parish, there will be other important races on the same ballot. You do not have to be in a particular party to vote on those races. On the same ballot citizens of the City of Natchitoches will have a Mayoral election, a Council Person at large election and three of the four City Council district races will be contested. The village of Clarence will have Mayoral, Alderman and Chief of Police races. The other issue on the ballot is a Natchitoches School Board Proposition for Consolidated School District 11 that includes all or part of 13 precincts.

The Natchitoches Parish Clerk of Court's office will have more information on the March 23 election as we get closer to Election Day. You can always call the office at 318-352-8152 if questions.

Interview Questions for District 3 Councilman Christopher Petite

1. Please name the neighborhoods or areas that are within your district.

Jackson Square, Airport Rd., Fairgrounds Rd., Hwy 478, University Parkway business corridor and NSU campus.

2. What have you implemented or name a specific thing that has been done that benefits your district?

Implementations, Volunteer efforts, services provided, etc.

As relating to our youth. We reestablished the Boys & Girls Club, our administration brought in Big Brothers Big Sisters mentoring program. Throughout the summer we employ a great number of youths to work in various departments, such as, public works, the fire station and the mayor's office. The program allows our youth to build a resume and gain work experience.

I have hosted a number of community clean-ups (volunteer-based) to address litter. I have worked with planning and zoning to address blight throughout the district. We have had some success in our attempts to address dilapidated properties throughout the district.

As noted early in my term as councilman we experienced two of the worst storms seen in Natchitoches Parish (Hurricane Laura). I did not waver in my response to a call of action. I volunteered and assisted with tree / limb removal, provided food, water & ice to those without power.

Worked to secure funding to revitalize Richardson Park. Secured a grant win of \$400,000 & additional funds with the aid of Mayor & city council. Totaling over a half of million dollars for the project.

3. Do you provide a report to the citizens of progress made? If so, would you like to share that report with the readers?

Yes. I have held a series of town halls to keep the citizens informed. I have also delivered handwritten letters to my constituents. I have used other means as well, such as, radio, social media, Natchitoches Times, and Natchitoches Journal. I most definitely will share future reports with the readers.

4. What is your vision for your district?

Key Areas of Focus:

Public Safety - It is of the upmost importance that citizens are safe. #1 Priority.

For me seeing new construction (homes) and community revitalization is at the top of my list. Natchitoches Next which is a comprehensive master plan for the City of Natchitoches looks to do just that.

We must continue to work and provide assistance to the elderly or those who are less fortunate.

I am committed to developing more positive programs for the youth of Natchitoches.

Any changes? Any additions you would like to see? Yes. I believe growth is important. I welcome the annexation of property for residential use. It is also my belief that we need a larger recreational facility for our youth.

5. What do you think is more important for our city right now: building new homes, rehabbing existing homes and adding commercial businesses to your district?

Most definitely the rehabbing of existing homes. I will continue to work to find funding to make this possible. Not against new construction as stated above. I also am encouraged that with the improvements to our water system we are putting ourselves in position to land another large manufacturing company, such as, Roy O Martin, International Papers, Pilgrims, or a Weyerhaeuser. We will continue to develop the University Parkway business corridor. My goal is to see that entire strip saturated with new developments, such as, the new auto mall & retail stores.

6. Some people in the community say they are concerned about crime in the City of Natchitoches, what is your suggestion to help with public safety?

We need to be able to retain good officers who have a passion for the communities they serve. We have increased our number of officers in this first term. We were short 11-13 officers & now we have only a vacancy of 5. We have made some progress as it relates to public safety. We have established Crime Stoppers, a com-

munity-supported non-profit organization **you do with it and why?**

I would use the funding to create a home revitalization program. My district consists of a lot of older homes. Through weatherization improvements and upgrades, these households can save on average \$372 or more every year.

9. What are your ideas to encourage community engagement in your district?

Through events, such as, National Night Out, initiatives, and outreach programs, I aim to bring people together and create meaningful relationships. I'm committed to fostering a sense of belonging and connection among all members of our community.






lives daily. This goes for all the parents that are raising up successful young women and men. The people in the community that are sharing their voices to let the community concerns be heard.

Chinquapin Subdivision, Keyser Avenue, Melrose Park, Pecan Park, Parkway Drive, South Williams, Shoreline, Pan Am, Town South, Hazel Drive, Greystone, Sadia, Clarence Drive, Abbie Drive, Lakeview Drive, Quida Drive, Woodyard Drive and South Drive.

2. What have you implemented or name a specific thing that has been done that benefits your district? Implementations, Volunteer efforts, services provided, etc.

There have been so many positive things that we have done over my time on the council, and I am glad that I have had the opportunity to always put the community first and address the needs of our citizens. I am very proud to have been able to help connect Town South and Pan Am by obtaining right of way to overlay Railroad Street. This allows each subdivision an additional railroad track crossing, in the event that a crossing is blocked by the train. In addition, an emergency road to Mill Street was installed in the event that both crossings were blocked. Another project that I am very proud of is the hard surface overlay of Sadia Street. This allows a secondary access to Hwy 1 for citizens on Abbie, Clarence and Lakeview Drive.

3. Do you provide a report to the citizens of progress made? If so, would you like to share that report with the readers?

We have done numerous Town Hall meetings, provide important

information on Social media, the City web page, the Go Natchitoches App and other media outlets.

Keeping our citizens informed will always be important to me.

4. What is your vision for your district?

District 2 has a good mix of Commercial Business and Residential Housing. We need to continue our efforts in Street overlays and improving water and sewer lines, so we are providing the best possible drinking water and providing sanitary sewer for our citizens.

5. What do you think is more important for our city right now: building new homes, rehabbing existing homes and adding commercial businesses to your district?

Building new homes, rehabbing old homes and demolishing blighted property are all important components that we need to continue to focus on.

6. Some people in the community say they are concerned about crime in the City of Natchitoches, what is your suggestion to help with public safety?

NPD has a huge task in dealing with our crime issues and has made progress on reducing some of our crime. The recent numbers indicate a reduction in certain crimes. I am hopeful that the State will change some of our current laws to help deter crime in the near future. We have made progress as a result of the pay increase recently given to Police and as a result we have filled most of the open positions. This means that we should have more police out patrolling and

responding to our citizens needs.

7. How do you plan to get more community involvement from the residents in your district?

Continue to do Town Hall Meetings, both in person and virtual. Increase Social media interaction and encourage citizens to download the Go Natchitoches app to stay informed on all City activity.

8. If you received a \$1 million grant to use for your district, what would you do with it and why?

I would put the money towards implementing some of the items in District 2 that are in the Safe Streets for all initiative. Some of those items are a proposed pedes-

trian walkway adjacent to the South Drive Bridge, sidewalks on Mill Street, Fairgrounds Road, Watson, Hancock and Parkway.

9. What are your ideas to encourage community engagement in your district?

Continue our efforts in programs such as National Night Out, Neighborhood cleanups and continuing to encourage participation in ongoing current events.

A crosswalk encounter that made me think.

As we wrap up another week, I want to share a personal experience that occurred to me this week that made me stop and ponder for a moment.

One evening, on my way back from a particularly long day at work, I found myself standing at a crosswalk, waiting to cross the street. I noticed a car approaching at a speed that made me unsure if it would stop in time. To my surprise, the car did stop, but right in the middle of the crosswalk, blocking my path.

What happened next was unexpected and left an impression on me. The

driver rolled down his window and apologized. He admitted he hadn't calculated his stop correctly and sincerely asked for my forgiveness for not giving me the right of way.

At that moment, my frustration dissolved. I smiled genuinely and assured him it was okay, wishing him a great day ahead. As I continued my way, I couldn't help but reflect on the interaction. It was a brief exchange, a minor hiccup in the grand scheme of things, yet it was profoundly humanizing.

The driver had the option to keep driving and only delay me for a fraction of a second, leaving me slightly irritated or angry at their behavior. However, he chose to completely block

my path, preventing me from continuing my way home and causing a much longer delay. Logically, it would have been better for me to be delayed for a shorter period, but as humans, we are primarily driven by emotions.

This experience reminded me of the power we all have to transform a potentially negative situation into a positive one, simply through acknowledgment and understanding. The driver's apology and my response created a moment of connection that turned an ordinary evening into a memorable one.

It's easy to underestimate the impact of our actions and words on others, especially in the hustle and bustle of daily life. Yet, this encoun-

ter showed me that taking a moment to recognize each other's humanity can have a ripple effect, spreading positivity and understanding in ways we might not anticipate.

Executive Order JML 24-01

Having been a teacher in the local school system for four decades, I will honestly say that I was never the toughest teacher in the building, but a person who truly tried my best to help children succeed. Even being retired for nearly three years, there are two groups of student's juniors and seniors that I am still familiar with at Natchitoches Central and whenever a former student asks me to write a letter of recommendation for a scholarship or a job, my answer to them is always yes and each time I try to write the best letter of recommendation that I can to help that child achieve their goal. As a teacher in grades 7-12, I was always pleased with the students who studied hard and passed my class, but my proudest moments as a teacher were in how many students that I could keep from failing my class. Whether you are teaching children in K-12 or on the college level or being on a local school board or state board of education, the major emphasis should always be on helping children prepare for the future and succeed!



Last summer, the Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education approved a policy to allow high school seniors across Louisiana who failed the LEAP Exit Exam an opportunity to appeal to the local school system. Through the appeal process, seniors who failed the test had to complete a portfolio project, demonstrate employability, and meet all the other Louisiana standards required to graduate. Understanding that a college education is not for everybody, the new policy seemed to be the right thing to do to keep a child from becoming a high school dropout statistic to being a high school graduate.

But on October 20, 2023, a Louisiana House Oversight Committee dominated by Republicans voted to nullify the new appeals process for the students who failed the Leap Test. Shortly afterward, to right a wrong, outgoing Democratic Governor John Bel Edwards on December 20, 2023, overruled the committee and allowed the appeals process to take effect.

But with **elections having consequences**, in early January of this year, Jeff

Landry was sworn in as Louisiana's next governor. Shortly after being sworn in, the new Republican Donald Trump endorsed governor signed his first **Executive Order** entitled **JML 24-01** that removed the appeals process for high school seniors who failed the LEAP Test. Shortly after the executive order, the Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education reported that a mere **seven** children in the State of Louisiana were granted an appeal process that will allow them to graduate from high school. Due to the new order, they will be the last.

As of this day, no new funding for remediating students who failed the test has been put in place by the new governor. So, moving forward, students can retest until they pass the test, or try and pass Louisiana's HISET Test (GED) or just drop out of school and become a statistic. As I close, I would feel much better if the person(s) who are doing this to children would just admit that the bottom line is that they are trying to do one thing and that is continuing to try and keep a permanent underclass in Louisiana. SMH!

It is deeply troubling to see divisive rhetoric being used to sow discord within our community, especially at a time when unity and solidarity are more important than ever. John Winston Responds to Diane Dodd's Letter to the Editor

I started in politics with the Voters and Civics League in 1972. Right here in the city of Natchitoches we were trying to get blacks on school boards, the police jury, and the city council. No blacks were in those offices at that time.

I worked with the voter's league and in 1974 I ran for police jury in the spring of 1974 and lost. In December of 1974 I signed up to run for the city council. It was through the efforts of the voter's league that we got the city council reapportioned. I represented district 3, and John Below represented district 4. We went on to city council together and 24 years later we got off the city council together. We had served 24 years a piece.

Diane Dodd doesn't know the struggle that John Below and I went through in those years. Anything in those 24 years, no exception, any bill, or any ordinance dealing with race, always lost not sometimes but ALWAYS lost 3 to 2. It was a 5-man council, 2 blacks and 3 whites. The vote always went down 3 to 2. John Below and I voted for the black issues and the 3 whites voted against us.

Throughout my years involved in politics, I supported, worked, canvassed, and organized for white candidates at the state and parish level. In fact, over the years, I worked and served for Don Kelly, Jimmy Long and various other statewide candidates and I never took a dime from any of them. They trusted me with managing their money and with canvassing in the black community or what have you and I never took one penny. Don Kelly is still living, and he can justify what I am saying. That's what I have been about. I want to tell Ms. Dodd that I have been putting forth those efforts. She wants to paint me as a

racist. I am not a racist! First, I am a Christian and I am not like some of these modern Christians. What I do know if I say I am a Christian I must love everybody. Not black, not white I have to love everybody. One thing about me, I respect you if you are black or white if you respect me. If you fight me, I am going to fight you. That's just the way it is. Now I understand politics is a rough game and you can't be weak kneed and be in politics. I am not weak kneed. I have a lot of white and black friends. I have a lot of black and white people that I don't care to fool with. The "thing" that I, John Below and all black politicians fought against, is the "establishment". I met with Billy West the other day with his podcast, and he didn't like the reference to establishment and evidently Ms. Dodd didn't either. An everyday white man is not a part of the establishment and is not a mover and shaker. The establishment is. Those are the people that make things happen politically not just in Natchitoches but across the state and nation. Ms. Dodd evidently does not understand what the civil rights movement is, she was over in California which is a whole lot better than living in Louisiana. She just got back here so she can't know or evidently didn't want to know what had gone on before. We always had to fight the "establishment". Martin Luther King fought the "establishment". The white citizens council, the city council, the legislatures stood in the way of progress. If everything was alright, we wouldn't be having this conversation.

Please restate this quote, "If everything was alright racially, we wouldn't be having this conversation because there would be no need for it."

Everything would be equal, but everything isn't equal. Why are we still fighting?

Another point I want to make to Ms. Dodd; we have had African Americans to run for mayor 5 times. I ran for mayor twice. Lost. The first time I lost by 64 votes. The 2nd time I ran I lost by about 1000 votes because incumbent Mayor Wayne McCullen had control of the department heads and the apparatus of the city government. So, I lost. I was not a sore loser. I went on about my business and said, well it wasn't for me. William Hymes, Marvin Blake, and Juanita Fowler ran and lost. None of those races including mine got more than 5 % of the white votes. In Mayor Ronnie Williams' last race, the only reason why, he won is because there were no more whites to vote. Lee Posey got 98% of the white votes and Ms. Dodd is talking about how inclusive Natchitoches is. She doesn't know what's going on or has gone on in Natchitoches. I wish to God that it was different, but I must deal with reality. It is what

it is. So, she criticized me for doing something political with recognizing what I am up against even the mayor doesn't realize and I hate to say it, he thinks that whites are going to vote for him, and I pray that they will. But reality tells me something different. "I pray that they will change but reality says different."

I want to get down to another statement she said, the establishment is dedicated to investing in the future of Natchitoches for decades and I say Prove It! History doesn't show that. I hope that it changes. I hope that she is right for the future. The past does not say that.

Another statement she made; the establishment is not a hierarchy seeking to suppress African American citizens, but rather a collective of individuals from all backgrounds working towards a common goal. I said, "Not so." She doesn't know the community, nor does she know the history. History says something totally different. Don't take my word for it. Go back and do your own research.

Reader Advocates for City, Parish to Seek RAISE Grants

Letter to the Editor and to the Citizens of Natchitoches Parish.

The Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) Grant allows Municipalities and Parishes to apply for up to \$25 Million dollars each year for FY 2021 through FY 2026.

- FY 2021 was not applied for. In FY 2022 the City of Natchitoches was awarded \$17,253,272 for its Natchitoches Safe Streets Revitalization Project.

FY2023 was not applied for.

The deadline for applications for FY2024 is rapidly approaching Feb. 28.

FY2025 and FY 2026 are yet to come.

The areas on the West side of Cane River within the city limits of the City of Natchitoches are qualified for 100% funding. The areas on the East side of Cane River within the city limits of Natchitoches qualify for an 80-20 split.

The Parish of Natchitoches meets all requirements according to the RAISE maps to qualify for 100% funding.

Possible Projects:

- A combination project between Natchitoches Parish and the City of Natchitoches Parish for upgrading Blanchard Road and Dirt Blanchard.

- Upgrading existing Amulet Street with curb and gutter streets, street lighting and sidewalks and extending Amulet Street to Hwy 1 would be a 100% grant project for the City of Natchitoches.

- The City of Natchitoches has \$300,000 for demolishing unused structures which would start the process of cleaning up Amulet Street.

The route basically follows the old mule train route into Natchitoches and should be on the National Historic list of trade routes. Additionally, coming from North on Hwy 6, it would eliminate stopping at three traffic lights to arrive in downtown Natchitoches.

- A four lane of Hwy. 1 from Lott Oil to Keyser Avenue. The widening of the bridge may qualify for funding under the BridgeInvestment Program, which requires an 80-20 split.

These grants are your tax dollars. Why not get some benefit?


He changed my old ways with words. He changed my old-level mind. He changed my heart and gave me a new
