Ensuring Equal Voting Access:

The John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act of 2021

Access to voting is a foundational principle of democratic society, ensuring that every voice is heard, and every citizen is represented. Despite legal protections such as the Voting Rights Act of 1965, black people and communities of color in the United States continue to face severe hindrances to exercising this fundamental civil right. These barriers prolong systemic disparities while undermining the principles of fairness and equality that support democracy.

Equal voting access is a critical civil rights issue, not just a question of convenience. In a democracy, fair and equal representation is essential to

ensuring that their elected officials recognize and address all citizens' problems and interests. The Constitution requires that electoral districts be established based on the concept of "one person, one vote," but discriminatory practices continue, oppressing minority voters and diminishing their political power.

Since the Shelby Supreme Court decision, states have passed a flood of voter suppression legislation that disproportionately harms people of color. These discriminatory measures include unnecessary photo ID legislation, voter registration restrictions, limits to early voting and mail-in ballots, and polling location closures. Furthermore, gerrymandering, or the manipulation of election boundaries for political benefit, reduces the voting power of black and other underprivileged communities.

Redistricting, the practice of redrawing electoral district lines to reflect demographic shifts, substantially impacts political representation. However, when done improperly, it can


disenfranchise communities of color by splitting or packing them into districts, thus reducing their voting power. Despite the protections provided by the 1965 Voting Rights Act, several states continue to establish district borders that perpetuate structural inequalities and limit minority voters' political involvement.

The John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act addresses these injustices. This act seeks to eliminate racially motivated voting hurdles and guarantee every citizen's right to vote by restoring and improving the Voting Rights Act's protections. It is critical

that Congress prioritize the adoption of this law to protect democratic norms and promote systemic equity.

To summarize, equal access to vote is not simply a civil rights problem but also a pillar of democracy. It is critical that all voting barriers, particularly those that disproportionately affect communities of color, be removed so that every citizen can fully engage in the democratic process. The John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act provides a critical chance to protect our democracy and move toward a future where every voice is heard and cherished!

I desire to continue providing effective leadership and service to Natchitoches Residents as Council at Large for the City of Natchitoches. As a public servant. Integrity and Honesty are of the utmost importance. Several opponents have not demonstrated those qualities and are being dishonest, deceptive and preying on the intelligence of residents and voters by being untruthful and falsely leading the public to believe that if elected they will rescind the utility rate increase which is totally untrue and an impossible promise, one that could undermine the safety, reliability and quality of our water, sewer and electric services. In order to ensure and provide a better quality of water, a larger volume production and meet the demands and needs of residents and new businesses brought into the city, upgrades to plant 3 are needed and the building of a new water treatment plant is essential for the growth of Natchitoches. In 2013 under the prior administration's leadership

the Louisiana Department of Health (LDH) mandated that the current water treatment plant be upgraded. In 2015 under the same administration, a General Bond Ordinance was executed for the improvements and construction of a new water treatment plant, and which required that the city set or fix rates to pay for utilities projects. Now the water treatment system is in such bad condition that the State ordered that it be fixed immediately, or the City would face harsh consequences. The Utilities Revenue Refunding Bonds were designated and maintained in the reserve fund and used solely for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on the series of the bonds. However, instead of the former administration upgrading the water system, the money was rededicated towards the building of PARC Natchitoches. The building of PARC left the Reserves depleted and city residents are left to repay the defaulted bond. The PARC's baseball tournament on its own **DOES** NOT currently generate sufficient revenues to pay the bond obligation. The Council had no choice but to honor

the commitment made by the previous administration to City bondholders that new rates would be implemented to repay loans for water projects. The current administration has now paid 2.5 million towards the loan and is expected to pay the remaining 2.5 million before the end of 2025. The rate increase also provided much needed raises to firemen and police. There is one total rate increase proposal with a 2-year implementation plan not 2 different increases as Opponents are falsely telling residents, which went into effect May 1, 2023. Forty percent of households use less than 2,000 gallons of water per month. Water issues have been neglected for too long and Natchitoches still have the lowest rates in the state. The Council only did what was mandated by LDH and as a result the city will have cleaner water. The current administration has always

been transparent about city finances and matters concerning the city's well-being, giving residents a chance to voice their opinions and concerns through town hall meetings, or by web. If YOU truly want to see Natchitoches continue to thrive and grow, I urge vou **NOT** to believe these false promises made by these opponents who are preying on the intelligence of voters. Dear Mayor,

As you know, I sent a letter dated November 21,2023 to you and all five (5) City Council members regarding your plans to build a fire station on University Parkway fronting Raggio Tires and closing the existing fire station on Martin Luther King Dr. This idea to build a fire station in the 1000-1100 block of University Parkway was, and Northwestern State University, we already have still is a BAD idea.

In the letter, I asked to meet with each of you one, or two at a time to avoid a quorum. I did meet to discuss this issue with Councilman Eddie Harrington in his office prior to sending my letter to each of you. After sending the letter, I was ignored by both You, and the City Council, as I did not receive a single call from any one to discuss my concern. I am disappointed in both You, and the City Council for your apparent lack of concern in regards to a very serious issue that could very well. in the future, impact the lives of some of our city residents if this initiative is followed thru.

Breda Town, Bailey Heights and Jackson Square are the oldest neighborhoods in the city and

because of age, they bear a higher risk for fire due to aging building materials including old wiring. However, that is not to say that some homes have not been rehabilitated over the years but, the vast majority probably have not.

I can agree on closing Fire Station 3 on martin Luther King Jr. Drive, if,(1) a new fire station is constructed on the four lane section of University Parkway near I-49 and (2) if a new fire station is constructed on Texas Street on, or near the new Public Works Department on Texas Street to service Breda Town, Bailey Heights, Jackson Square, Nolley Point, Monroe Road, the Fox Run area and the north La Hwy 3175 By Pass.

We do not need another fire station in front of Central Fire Station which is less than a mile from the front gate. Place two fire stations where they can better service the community.

I am still available to discuss this issue and I must say to those citizens that live in the areas I listed in paragraph 4, I would be upset for losing my fire station and will now suffer a longer response time. The response time from the new station will be longer to the majority of its re-

Be Respectful


No parent-child relationship is perfect. I've heard people say how their parents get on their nerves. From time to time, parents may say and do things that cause some frustration. It



I remember an old nursery rhyme from childhood:


"Jack Sprat could eat no fat His wife could eat no lean. And so, between them both, you see They licked the platter clean."

toches Central High School. He also worked at the city pools for nearly 60 years and taught thousands of chil-






dren how to swim. In 2015, he was inducted into the Grambling Legends Sports Hall of Fame.

Louisiana Criminal Justice Reform 2024

The **8th Amendment** to the Constitution, along with the rest of the Bill of Rights, was ratified on December 15, 1791. It has served as a limitation upon the state or federal government's ability to impose **cruel and unusual punishment** on criminal defendants before and after a conviction.

In June 2017, former Democratic Governor John Bel Edwards signed a comprehensive criminal justice reform package comprising six Republicans, two Democrats, and one independent. The reform package came about because Louisiana has one of the highest incarceration rates in the country. After the new law was enacted, it was estimated that it would save the state \$270 million per year.

Seven years later, with a new Republican Governor and a Supermajority Republican House and Senate, in a special session of the legislature held in February of this year, Criminal Justice Reform 2024 became law, emphasizing not saving state funds but making laws dealing with criminal justice tougher.

One law designed to protect police officers in Louisiana dealt with **Qualified Immunity.** Under the new qualified immunity law, lawsuits can only be filed against a police officer, which

has established prior to the suit that an individual's statutory or constitutional right has been violated. If not, there can be no lawsuit against a police officer. Also passed in the special session was a law that toughens sentencing guidelines for the **crime** of **carjacking**. The new law will mandate that anyone found guilty of carjacking in Louisiana will now be sentenced to twenty years in prison, up from a previous sentence of five years. Also passed in the session was a bill that lowered the age to 17 for violent offenders to be tried as an adult.

The most serious of criminal justice reform laws passed dealt with the **method(s)** that will now be used in the **Execution** of individuals sentenced to **Death** in Louisiana. With the new law, those on death row will now be put to death using nitrogen gas and or the electric chair. In addition to the new execution law, individuals found guilty of a serious crime after August 1, 2023, in Louisiana will now have to serve a mandatory 85% of their sentence before being eligible for parole. In prior years, the time served to be eligible for parole or early release was between 25% to 40%.

After reading and analyzing some of the new laws passed, I understand the reasoning behind increasing the sentences

of those who commit the crime of **carjacking.** I am unsure about trying 17-year-olds **as an adult** in a court of law. In addition, due to the seriousness

of some crimes, it is tough to envision, but understandably, 17-year-olds can now be **tried** as adults in a court of law. In addition, having been around police officers most of my young life and having many policemen whom I consider friends, I believe that qualified immunity for law enforcement officers is the right thing to do.

To close, this new law that mandates that prisoners serve at least 85% of their sentence, for lack of better words, is just mean-spirited. Maybe for some who may need a longer sentence, but for all? And being neither a critic nor proponent of the death penalty, I have not found any justifiable or reasonable explanation for the use of nitrogen gas and or the electric chair to execute convicted murderers in Louisiana.

DID YOU

Natchitoches was established in 1714 by **Canadien explorer Louis** Juchereau de St. Denis. It is the oldest permanent **European settlement** within the borders of the 1803 Louisiana Purchase. 306 years later, the first **African American Mayor** Ronnie Williams Jr. was elected to office.





Uncle Jack "The Good Darky" statue was displayed for 41 years at the corner of Washington and Lafayette Streets in Natchitoches. The plaque at the bottom of the statue read, "Erected by the City of Natchitoches in grateful recognition of the arduous and faithful service of the good darkies of Louisiana." The African American community did not generally like the statue as it provided a subservient and inferior view of the race. In 1997, Mayo Angelo criticized the statue, writing: "Uncle Jack is the quintessential obsequious Negro servant ... The droop of his shoulders bears witness not only to his years but more



specifically to his own understanding of his place as a poor black in a rich white world." During the civil rights era, the statue was protested, and in 1968, the city of Natchitoches peacefully removed it. The Good Darky statue is now housed in the back of the Baton Rouge, Louisiana Rural Life Museum.







City of Natchitoches Announces Kickoff Meetings for Grant Projects

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

Natchitoches Mayor Ronnie Williams, Jr., announces that "kickoff" meetings were held today for two major grant projects for which the city was awarded a total of over \$20 million in Federal funding.

Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development District 08 and Headquarters officials were in Natchitoches today for a scoping meeting for the Natchitoches Safe Streets Revitalization project, for which the city was awarded \$17.2 million in Federal Rebuilding American Infrastructure Through Sustainability and Equity [RAISE] grant funding. Although this project targets improve-awarded \$3.16 million in Federal grant funds. ments along the Texas Street corridor and adjacent streets in West Natchitoches, the grant also impacts virtually all other parts of the city, including Keyser Avenue, University Parkway, and the campus of Northwestern State University, through implementation of safety improvements identified in the Natchitoches Bicvcle and Pedestrian Master Plan that was developed back in 2017. Today's

meeting, along with execution of the Project Agreement between DOTD and the City last week, marks the official beginning of the design consultant procurement process that will lead to the development of construction plans, thus making this vital project one step closer to becoming a reality.

The RAISE grant meeting followed a virtual "kickoff" meeting between City officials and staff of the Louisiana Office of Community Development to initiate the study phase of the Louisiana Watershed Initiative Round 2 project for South Natchitoches Drainage Improvements, for which the City was recently This project will address flooding and drainage issues along Fairgrounds Road and Industrial Drive, as well as in Pan Am and Town South subdivisions.

"I'm proud of these and many other grant program wins we've been a part of over the past three-plus years that will improve the quality of life for our citizens," stated Mayor Williams, who added, "And we continue to



apply for other grants and to take advantage of other funding opportunities as they arise." These include the Safe Streets for All [SS4A] implementation grant program, for which funding is being sought for constructing needed roadway safety improvements identified in the recently-completed SS4A Action Plan, for which the City previously received \$280,000 in tact the Office of the Mayor at (318) 352-2772.

Federal funds: as well as the Federal "earmark" program, for which funding is being sought for implementation of the first phase of the Campus Edge District improvements identified as part of the Natchitoches Next Master Plan.



-What does it mean to trust God?-

Trusting God Definition: Trusting God is an essential element of true and saving faith that looks to God and finds peace, strength, contentment, and much more in him, and all that he has done, is doing, and will do, both now and forever in his Son Jesus Christ. Trusting God is one of those truths we think we understand until we are called upon to do it, and then we discover that there is more to it than we realized. Trusting God is an aspect of saving faith which has been said to have three elements to it: knowledge, assent, and trust (cf. John Gill, Body of Divinity, vol. 1 [Grand Rapids: Baker Book House, 1978], 411). All three aspects go together, but without trust, faith is inadequate and shockingly indistinguishable from the faith of demons who believe and shudder before God, yet do not repent and surrender themselves to him (Jas. 2:19 cf. Ps.



78:22). Trusting God is essential to Christian life. This, however, does not mean it is easy to trust God, especially in a world that questions the sanity of

trusting him at almost every turn. Nevertheless, trust God we must, and the Bible has much to say that will help us no matter what our circumstances. We Are Commanded to Trust God The first thing to understand is that we are commanded to trust the Lord. In Psalm 4:5 David tells the reader to "offer right sacrifices and put your trust in the Lord." Proverbs 3:5-6 exhorts us to "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him and he will make straight your paths." In fact, the Christian life is one of trust in God from the beginning to the end. In its inception we repent and believe the gospel (Mark 1:15) and then all the way through we are called upon to believe God, and to believe in the Lord Jesus

who is the way, the truth, and the life (John 14:1, 6). As the writer to the Hebrews reminds us, "without faith it is impossible to please God,

for whoever would draw near to God must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who seek him (11:6).

Maintaining Your Gift The Gift of Gold, Frankincense, and Myrrh

Anytime you maintain something, you want to continue to have it, keep it in existence, or not allow it to become less valuable. Queen Esther knew how to maintain her gifts in the book of Esther. Her life and her family's life were on the line. When the enemy came, it found no expression in her life. Queen Esther understood who she was. Not only that, but a few of Esters' gifts were leadership, wisdom, and prayer. Ester was very wise in deploying her gifts. She confidently presented her gifts to the king because she knew who she was.

Living in a world full of obstacles could be challenging. Whether you are part of fivefold ministries or have a gift to share with the world, you can maintain your gift. The book of I Peter 4:10 says, "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace'. That tells us that our gifts are not to be used for ourselves. Our gifts can save others' lives. So, we have to nurture and protect it at all costs.

God took me back to the three wise men in Matthew 2:1–12 when I thought about gifts. These men were very wise for several reasons. They understood that you cannot just bring any gift before the Lord. Your gift must be pure and represent who Jesus is.

In order to maintain your gifts, you must understand three things. These gifts represent who He is and who you are. Jesus came as King of Israel (messiah), Priest of God (to atone for man's sins), and prophet of God (speaking God's words). The wise men's gifts represented each office in prophetic typology and pointed to all Jesus would do in His incarnation and glorification. Your gift must glorify God and dignify who He is.

Gift one: The wise men brought gold. Gold is symbolic of Christ's deity as a king. The gift of gold, given by one of the wise men, pointed to the begotten Son, who God gave to be the King of His people. One way to maintain your gift of gold is to understand who you are. Revelation 1:6 KJV: And hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father; to him be glory and dominion for ever and ever. Amen. We are kings and priests and cannot allow ourselves to become less than that. God has delegated some of His royal authority to us, giving humankind rule and dominion over His creation. We must rule and rule well; the Bible is



always the blueprint to guide us through.

Gift two: The wise men brought the second gift to Jesus, Frankincense, the high priest of God. Frankincense is an aromatic, clear resin from trees in northern India and Arabia. Frankincense is also a symbol of prayer. (Psalm 141:2, Luke 1:10, Revelation 5:8). It was used in the Bible to anoint prophets for their divinely

appointed work of revealing God communicating His will and words to His people. Importantly, you must spend time with the Father to maintain your gift. Prayer keeps the oil burning upon you, protects you from evil, and keeps the boiler room

hot!! I don't know about you, but when the enemy comes, I need to be full of the fire.

Gift three: Last but not least, the wise men brought Myrrh as a gift. Myrrh means prophet of God, and this gift is very important for the prophets. Myrrh is a spice with a sweet smell that was used for medicine, cosmetics, and anointing oil. It was mixed with the oil used to anoint prophets. This oil distinguishes you from everybody else. Your gift must send off a scent that draws others.

In 1 Samuel 16:13, out of all David's brothers. God chose him. It doesn't matter who is in line first. The oil in this season will cause people on high to look for you and call your name out. To maintain your gift, you must have the oil upon you. In the book of 1 Samuel 17:33, when the youngest Son came before Samuel, the prophet commissioned him by anointing him as the future king. That tells us that for everything David did, God had him. David was called by God and had the gifts upon him. When God calls you, no one can stop it!!



NSU Foundation Announces Record Fund Raising and Endowment Performance Success

NATCHITOCHES – The Northwestern State University Foundation secured over \$7 million in private contributions in 2023, exceeding the previous year total by over \$2 million and marking the third straight year that the Foundation has recorded increases in contributions year over year.

The Foundation also announced record endowment returns and growth in 2023, outperforming peer educational institutions and exceeding state and national averages. A recent analysis conducted by Clearview Fiduciary Alliance ranked the NSU Foundation in the first quartile compared to peer institutions across the country with a return of 16 percent. This boost in performance and increases in endowment contributions led to overall growth of the portfolio. While other institutions in Louisiana grew an average of 2.5 percent last year, the NSU Foundation endowment grew 8.4 percent, exceeding the national average of 7.7 percent, according to the National Association of College and University Business Officers. Its study examined 688 endowments with combined assets of \$839 billion.

NSU Foundation Executive Director

Drake Owens attributed fundraising and endowment performance success to key support from donors, staff and volunteers as well as the Foundation's proactive approach in developing partnerships with business, industry and organizations that promote education and economic development.

"Contributions from major donors and strategic positioning by the NSU Office of Development and members of the NSU Foundation Fundraising and Finance/Investment committees resulted in a record year for private support and endowment performance," Owens said.

NSU President Marcus Jones expressed his gratitude stating, "The display of support by our donors shows that NSU is an institution worthy of investment. The Office of Development works tirelessly to garner support and their dedication to securing private funds is evident and greatly appreciated."

"Our donors are committed to investing in the future of NSU and have showed tremendous generosity and support," said NSU Director of the Office of Development Jill Bankston. "We have a great team and their passion for NSU and desire to succeed continues



to pay dividends for our institution."

The ripple effect of the Foundation's success extends throughout the university's service region. A 2022 economic impact study reported that NSU contributed nearly \$520 million to the economy of northwest and central Louisiana and supported

the creation of 7,200 jobs in the region.

"The outlook for fundraising and endowment performance success is positive as 2024 trends indicate the NSU Foundation is on track for another record year for fundraising and endowment growth," Owens said.

This is what a white man my father worked for gave him this plaque. Sam Lawrence, a man's right hand, always there when needed. Polite, honest, hardworking and a friend. D.H. Whittington 1965. He passed in 84. I still have the plaque.

My life hasn't changed much at 85. I have always served one God, one Faith, Baptist, and one Baptism. I was led into Cane River by deacon Flanagan and Rev Carter emerged full body into the water at the age of 13.
