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Central High Team's Impact on Future Athletes in Natchitoches:

The Forgotten Women and the Role We Played in Black History in 1961, 1964, & 1965

As a girl growing up in an all-black segregated school during the civil rights movement, I witnessed the start of a remarkable team. This all-black girl team started at LP Vaughn, then known as North Natchitoches Elementary School, was a testament to resilience. Despite the school only going up to 6th grade, in 1961, this team emerged victorious, winning a parish championship.

This success led to the expansion of the school to include 7th, 8th, and 9th grades, transforming it into a Junior High School. The coaches, Vera Kay Johnson, I.C. Compest, Hydria Baptiste, and Mr. Vaughn, played a pivotal role in this journey. After completing the 9th grade at North Natchitoches Elementary School, the same all-black girl team transitioned to Central High School in the 10th grade. This transition was a significant milestone in our journey, marking our progression to a higher level of competition and recognition. We took over the Central High girls' team in the 10th grade.



In 1964, we took the Central Varsity team to All-State at Grambling State University. We played in the final and lost to Mansfield LA by 1 point. This same boys and girls team went to All States in 1965 at Southern University in Baton Rouge, La. Central High boys team came back All State Champions. One player, Charles Bloodworth, was nominated as Mr. All-State and placed in our Natchitoches Hall of Fame. We had two players, Lee Madison and Howard Green, who were nominated MVPs. One girl nominated MVP, Gloria Armstrong "Rabbit" Ibn-Mohammed. All were players for an "All Black Central High School." We still have living women who played on these teams: Alice Davis Hardison, Eloize Dixon, Kara Dorsey, Mattie Grace Hardison, Gloria Demery, Sandra Jones, Pearlie Casson, Ethel Mae Johnson, and Elizabeth Colton. The coaches of the Central High School boys and girls' teams were Reverend Joseph Dupree and Coach Barron. Despite the segregation that prevented us from playing in college or the WNBA, the Central High School 'All Black' girl team made significant contributions. Our legacy lives on in the young women who can now pursue their basketball dreams in college and the WNBA, thanks to the barriers we broke down. To Caitlin Clark, Angel Reese, and Kamillar Cardoso, please recognize the sacrifices we made to help you reach your current success. We want to share this message with the community to highlight how we helped pave the way for athletes like you. To all the coaches who poured their hearts and souls into us, we owe you a debt of gratitude. Your sacrifices were instrumental in shaping the All-Black North Natchitoches Jr. High School and Central High School of 1961, 1964, and 1965. We are forever grateful for your unwavering support and guidance. Central High, we owe our hearts to Central High. We will always be loyal to them. We love them with all our hearts and souls. We will forever honor Maroon and Gold.

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Natchitoches African American History: Professor JW Thomas and his Contributions

Natchitoches, founded in 1714, is the oldest permanent settlement in the Louisiana Purchase and prides itself on a rich cultural and educational development history. The early 20th century saw significant efforts to establish educational opportunities for African Americans, a challenging task due to the Jim Crow laws and systemic inequalities. Despite these obstacles, community leaders like Professor JW Thomas played a vital role in these initiatives, recognizing education as a critical avenue for community empowerment.

Professor JW Thomas was a key educator and community leader in Natchitoches. In 1910, he came to Natchitoches from Baton Rouge. He headed a committee of African American citizens that purchased land on Jackson Square to establish a school building for Black boys and girls. By 1912, a three-room frame building was completed, and the school, named Lincoln Institute, opened with dedicatory exercises under his leadership with a faculty of three members. This institution struggled through the years but marked a significant step in providing education for African American children.

In 1919, the Board of Trustees of Lincoln Institute deeded the property to the Natchitoches Parish School Board, marking a significant milestone in the school's history. This transition led to the expansion of the school with additional rooms and teachers, eventually evolving into the Natchitoches Parish Training School. This progression, supported by the Rosenwald Fund, underscores Professor Thomas's foundational role in institutionalizing education for African Americans in the area.

The legacy of Professor JW Thomas is evidenced by the naming of the J.W. Thomas Apartments in Natchitoches, a low-income housing complex, because of his enduring influence on the community, honoring his contributions to education and community development, reflecting his status as a respected figure. Historical accounts, such as those from the Civil War to the Civil Rights Project, emphasize the importance of self-help networks among African Americans, with education being a priority, and Professor Thomas's efforts align with this tradition.

Today, Natchitoches continues to value its educational heritage, with institutions like Northwestern State University and the Natchitoches Parish School System reflecting a deep-rooted commitment to education. Professor JW Thomas's work laid foundational stones for these efforts, particularly in addressing historical inequities in education for African Americans. His legacy, as seen in the naming of community landmarks, serves as a proud reminder of the community's unwavering commitment to educational access and community leadership.

Professor JW Thomas was a pivotal educator in Natchitoches, Louisiana, instrumental in establishing the Lincoln Institute and advancing African American education in the early 20th century. His work continues to have a profound impact, serving as a reminder of the importance of educational access and community leadership. This exploration underscores the enduring significance of local history in understanding community development and the ongoing impact of educational pioneers like Professor Thomas.

What Happened to Tyrone Turner? From a family member's perspective...

Due to the sensitivity of this matter, the parties involved have not been mentioned.

Can you tell me about Tyrone Turner?

He was a football player. He tried to play basketball, but he hit too hard. He was a hard hitter. He was good at football. Every time he hit someone, he would break something on them. He and Ed were bad.

What do you remember about the day he passed?

I was working in Coushatta driving tractors when he passed. Two guys on the ranch came and got me. I could not leave because it hurt so bad. I tried to get to Natchitoches in a hurry, but it wasn't no hurry. I had to take my time to get there, but when I got there, he was gone. It was a hurting feeling. When you lose a child, it hurts worse than losing a mom or a daddy. A lot of people have not experienced that.

Did they rule it a suicide?

They tried to put it on a suicide. Actually, his folder did not have anything in it. The DA at the time let me see his folder, and there was nothing in it. The only thing in the folder now is what I had put in it and the way I saw it. Tyrone was a good worker. When he got killed, he had two jobs, and there is no way he would have shot his self.

He was working for the city, driving tractors. He was 24 years old at that time.

What made you think it was more than a suicide?

Well, I know what each one of my kids would do at that time. Suicide was totally off the table. He did not have any reason to commit suicide because he was too happy. He had a little Nissan truck, brown with a white top. He loved kids too. He would pass by and toot his horns at kids and they would come out of their homes laughing.

He was always a fun person. Edward and Tyrone were best friends.

How did you come to the conclusion of what happened with his file not having anything in it?

The DA showed me the file, and there was nothing in it, so I knew there was more. The detective who was on the case went to school with the girl's daddy. They were really good friends. We were all close. I don't know; the detective just left something out, and I was upset with him for a long time because he didn't have anything in the folder.

So, did the detective come out and take statements but did not put anything in the folder?

Well, he was out on the scene and didn't put anything in the folder.

What about the girl?

They would not talk to the family. They told my ex-wife that if she did not get off the case and let it alone, they would not let her see the baby, so she had to let up off of it.

Was she the girlfriend? No, she was the wife. They had 1 child together.

Did Tyrone mention problems with the wife?


They were in the process of buying a house in East Natchitoches, and Tyrone said he wasn't going to buy a house for another man to live in. He knew she was messing around. He told me that.

Did he confront her, or did they get into it about it? I don't know what he said to her. That's what he told me.

We just let it go from there.

Tyrone was well known.

He was a football player for Campti High School #45. His picture is supposed to be in Lakeview School on the wall. They retired Tyrone's number 45.
